# **Chief education officer** safeguards former mascot

As summer nears, thoughts of snow and cold become a distant memory. In Highland Park, however, the appearance of a beloved polar bear – the longtime high school mascot – is welcomed and overdue.

"It's an incredible discovery," said Zakia Gibson, chief education officer for the Highland Park School District. "For years, many area residents and high school alumni have frantically searched for their long-lost mascot. Our polar bear has finally come back home."

The solid-rock, brilliant white bear weighs in at a hefty 600 pounds. Presented by the classes of 1931-1932, every graduating class of Highland Park Community High School added their signatures to it only to be sandblasted annually to make way for the next grads. Sculptor Samual Cashwan, who created the polar masterpiece, was renowned for his work, serving as head of the Detroit Society of Arts and Crafts and, later, with the Works Progress Administration.

The bear went into hibernation (and was not seen) since the high school's closure in 2012. For over 90 years, the high school had served as the heart of the district before its demolition.

In addition to the infamous polar bear, Gibson secured a litany of other high school memorabilia, including a time capsule, trophies, yearbooks and other historical archives. The time capsule dates back to 1977 when the city of Highland Park and



the Highland Park Community High School buried it under the theme, "Striving for Excellence; Learning for Life."

"The polar bear's return, along with all this wonderful history, marks a fantastic comeback for the Highland Park School District," said Gibson. "Our scholars are pursuing academic excellence, the district is financially sound and tomorrow has never looked brighter for our community."

The HPSD Board of Education welcomed back the beloved mascot with great gratitude June 16. The district plans to preserve the historic items for the enjoyment of school alumni and the community.
